Quiet Routes Work with partner LA's to develop a network of Quiet Routes across the HITRANS region. Quiet Routes are a way of delivering active travel network connections in rural areas where segregated infrastructure is not feasible or would be cost-prohibitive. These roads are an integral part of the transport network in rural communities, and are often the only way to access services, sites of interest, and recreational opportunities. HI-BIKE was one year old in October! To celebrate, we've added three additional docking stations and 20 bikes, at Culloden Library, Hilton Community Centre and Charleston Community Complex. Opening Day events were held on 25th and 26th October which were well attended by people living or working locally.

Highland Council now have a new Project Manager to progress conversion of the three virtual stations at Raigmore Hospital, Eden Court Theatre and Inverness Leisure / Rugby Club through the LCTT funding awarded in 2018. All being well, these will be installed next Spring, along with our 3 new stations at Merkinch, Milton of Leys and Smithton, bringing our total to 12 stations and 92 bikes for Summer 2023, plus 10 longtail bikes which can carry cargo or children.

We are looking forward to seeing membership and rides increase as the scheme expands into more residential areas of the City.
