## **ACTIVE TRAVEL UPDATE**

## **Purpose of Report**

This Report provides Board Members with an update on Active Travel projects in which HITRANS are currently involved.

# **UPDATE ON REGIONAL ACTIVE TRAVEL BUDGET 2023-24 (Transport Scotland)**

For **2023/24 financial year** HTRANS has been granted an additional £45,000 for Mobility Hubs, and £10,000 as Resource Support to develop proposals for the Behaviour Change and Access to Bikes funding in 2024-25. This brings the total budget to £1,010,000 from Transport Scotland's Regional Active Travel Fund. A progress update is provided below.

Mobility Hubs & Micromobility	The bulk of this funding is allocated to supporting the HI-BIKE eBike share scheme in Inverness and Fort William, and the additional funding from Transport Scotland will cover the cost of recovering assets from the closed schemes in the Central Belt and expanding the Inverness scheme. We have retrieved the redundant assets from the Falkirk and East Lothian schemes, and employed a mechanic to begin working through the secondhand bikes while also maintaining the existing fleet.  We have a budget of approximately £100,000 for the remainder of the financial year for HI-BIKE and wider Mobility Hubs and Micromobility.	Available £295,000
5.	Quiet Routes & NCN	The Glencoe route has been installed and data is being gathered on use by all modes, and local feedback collected. We are still awaiting installation of the two Skye routes, and the final report on the pilot is due by mid-2024. Multi modal counters will be installed in the Spring in Orkney on potential routes in 5 areas in Orkney, and preliminary speed data will also be gathered before deciding which routes to take forward. #### **ACTIVE TRAVEL FUNDING IN 2024-25**

#### REGIONAL ACTIVE TRAVEL GRANT

This fund, which has been made available to RTPs by Transport Scotland for the past 5 years will no longer exist. Instead, funding for Behaviour Change and Access to Bikes will be channeled through Regional Transport Partnerships – this is covered in a separate paper. RTP's are also invited to bid in to the Active Travel Infrastructure Fund for capital projects which can be delivered within the financial year 24-25; see below.

# ACTIVE TRAVEL INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

In addition to the Behaviour Change funding, RTPs are invited to bid for "shovel ready" capital infrastructure projects for delivery in 2024-25. This fund is for construction only, with an emphasis on path construction and no allowance for design funding. We propose to submit the following bid to Transport Scotland for the 2<sup>nd</sup> February deadline:

Drumnadrochit Active Travel Link: 225m of shared use path from the Loch Ness Hub
towards the school, alongside the A82 trunk road. This project came out of our
Mobility Hubs work in 2022-23 when HITRANS funded a design to improve the
existing footway infrastructure to enable shared use, and build a new shared use
path through the car park at Loch Ness Hub. This will enable both local people and
visitors to access the Hub and the local path network by bike without having to travel

- on the A82. The project requires co-ordination between the two landowners, Highland Council and Transport Scotland. Cost: £330,000 (including Project Management allowance).
- Quiet Routes: learning from the pilot in Highland, we have requested funding to expand Quiet Routes across the region in Orkney, Western Isles and Highland. Cost: 100,000.

Board Members are asked to note the report and approve funding requests to Transport Scotland for next financial year.
